

Western Jurisdiction Issues Invitation to Historical Society Members to Attend 2017 Annual Meeting in Anchorage, Alaska



On behalf of the Western Jurisdictional Commission on Archives and History, I want to issue a special invitation to you to be a part of the joint meeting of Western Jurisdiction Commission

and the Historical Society of The United Methodist Church which will be held in Anchorage, Alaska June 26-29, 2017 at our Methodist-founded institution of Higher Learning, Alaska Pacific University.

The meeting will highlight some of the people, places and events that have historical significance for us within the western United Methodist Church and especially Alaska. Alaska was first serviced by the Woman's Home Missionary Society in Unga in 1886 and then at the Jesse Lee Home in Unalaska in 1890. The Gold Rush in the late 1890s, fishing industries, the fur industry headed by the Russian merchants brought many people to the District of Alaska and these people needed spiritual guidance along with economic survival. Initially this was accomplished by the Russian Orthodox, then the Catholics, Moravians, and then the others including Methodists. We will highlight these stories with presentations and field trips.

2017 is a banner year for Alaska. It is Alaska's Sesquicentennial. It has been 150 years since Alaska was purchased from Russia. Celebrations are being planned all during 2017. Some of these celebrations will happen during our June meeting.

Many when they hear the word "Alaska" vision its geology and biological beauty as well as it's outdoor activities, but our meeting in 2017 will add

a cultural history dimension to that agenda, as we learn about Methodist activity since 1886, Alaska indigenous people's involvement, and many social and economic issues that provide a basis for mission outreach.

Since traveling to Alaska is a long distance for many of you, it is suggested that you will want to either come a few days early or stay a few days after to see some of the many interesting sites in the Anchorage area or in other places in Alaska. The summer solstice with its 20 hours of sun light has many special activities. However, this is prime tourist season so it is important to make reservations early.

Place accept our invitation to the June 26 to 29, 2017 meeting to learn about Methodism in the West and Alaska and experience a small portion of the beauty of Alaska. Mail your registration today.

Message from the President

— Dr. Priscilla Pope-Levison

In his magnum opus on Methodism, Methodism: Empire of the Spirit, David Hempton pronounces this grand statement: " ... the history of Methodism is really a history of female preponderance," or, reiterating the same point in another way, he writes, " ... Methodism was without question preponderantly a women's movement." Beyond the Dr. Priscilla Pope-Levison fact that women were the majority of Methodism,



Hempton argues that they also *shaped* the movement. To quote Hempton again, "Quite simply, as purveyors of hospitality, deaconesses, visitors, evangelists, prayers, exhorters, testifiers, class members and leaders, and preachers, women helped define the character of the Methodist movement."

Women in Methodism—very ordinary women, not just the "rock stars" like Susanna Wesley and Phoebe Palmer—contributed vastly to shaping and defining the movement, and they did this by banding together in organizations, like the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the Woman's Home Missionary Society, the deaconess movement, and more. These organizations eventually merged into what we know today as United Methodist Women. UMW, 800,000 members strong, represents the current iteration of Methodist women's organizing, which has been going strong for nearly a century and a half. Hence, the approaching sesquicentennial of UMW in 2019.

In anticipation of this important anniversary, UMW hosted a conference at the Methodist Theological School in Ohio on the topic, "United Methodist Women: Voices Lost and Found." I am pleased to report that some of the papers presented at that conference have been published in a double issue of *Methodist History* and are accessible to HSUMC members in hard copy (if you pay for that subscription level) or online on the GCAH website at this link: http://archives.gcah.org/handle/10516/9855

Many of the women featured in these pages will not be familiar even to regular readers of *Methodist History*. In his article on Methodist women in Iowa, Andrew Klumpp unearths women like Hattie N. Wilcox and Martha Snyder who, as minister's wives, faced "the struggles of itinerancy on the expansive prairies." Some women he discovered were only identified by their husband's name, like Mrs. O.H. P. Faus and Mrs. George W. Pratt. Beyond the United States, Paul Chilcote and Ulrike Shuler introduce readers to the Methodist Bible women of Bulgaria and Italy who "laid a foundation for Methodist mission before the WFMS missionaries even arrived." In the appendix, four Bulgarian names and 29 Italian names fill a list of Methodist Bible women.

In her opening lecture for the conference—which serves as the first article in the Methodist History double issue—Dana Robert, historian and missiologist, argues that the women featured represent three core Methodist values: 1) The "continuous narrative of believers' witness" from early Methodism to today; 2) The history of United Methodism, in agreement with David Hempton, is a women's movement; and 3) The "rich matrix of community engagement that stretches beyond the local church."

Take time to read the latest double issue of *Methodist History* from cover to cover, then share it with a pastor, lay leader, Sunday School teacher, UMW member, youth group leader, and beyond!

Where do you plan to stay? Attendees will have a choice of accommodations: The least expensive will be either of the two university dormitories: the Alaska Pacific University **shared** rooms with kitchen, bath, lounge area for \$50 per person; or the University of Alaska Anchorage dormitory rooms for \$50 per night. In addition to the room fee there is a 12% bed tax the Municipality imposes on the room.

Another choice would be the Spring Hill Suites by Marriott at Anchorage University Lake; 907-751-6300; or another place of your own choosing. Ivan G. Corbin has been a pastor in the Florida Annual Conference since 1986, serving churches as new as Peace United Methodist Church in Orlando and as historic as the Key West United Methodist Church (Formerly the First United Methodist "Old Stone" Church) in Key West (1844) where he oversaw the merger of three historic United Methodist congregations.

Ivan has served leadership positions for the Florida Conference Commission on Archives and History and a member of the Florida Conference and Southeast Jurisdiction Historical Societies serving as president for both groups. He has been a member of Southeast Jurisdiction Commission for eight years, Chairperson for his final four. A term of service with the General

Commission on Archives and History put him in connection Historical Society of the United Methodist Church.

Ivan is a genealogist. To his delight, he has discovered his fifth great grandfather, Samuel Forwood I of Deer Creek in Harford County, Maryland, appears in Bishop Francis Asbury's journal numerous times. 

Nominations Open for Sister M. Claude Lane, O.P. Memorial Award

The Society of American Archivists' Awards Committee is seeking nominations for the Sister M. Claude Lane, O.P., Memorial Award. This award recognizes individuals who have made a significant contribution to the field of religious archives. It is named in honor of Sister M. Claude Lane, the first professionally trained archivist at the Catholic Archives of Texas in Austin, who served there from 1960 until her death in 1974. The award is sponsored by the Society of Southwest Archivists, in conjunction with Society of American Archivists.

Criteria for nomination include:

- Involvement and work in the Archivists of Religious Collections Section (ARCS) of the Society of American Archivists.
 - Contributions to archival literature that relates to religious archives.
 - Participation and leadership in religious archives organizations.
 - Evidence of leadership in specific religious archives.

Only individual archivists are eligible for nomination. The award finalist is recognized with a certificate from SAA and a \$300 cash prize provided by the Society of Southwest Archivists at the annual Society of American Archivists meeting.
